AO2 Refine work by exploring ideas, selecting and experimenting with appropriate media, materials techniques and processes.

AO3 Record ideas, observations and insights relevant to intentions as work progresses.

AO4 Present a personal, and meaningful response that realises intentions and demonstrates understanding of visual language.
