Structure of the course

- 2 Exams, worth 50% each (In May) students are aware of the dates
- Out of 80; time allocation 1.5 hours
- Paper 1 Components of CPU and their uses, Networking, Environmental, ethical, cultural issues
- Paper 2 Computational thinking and programming techniques. Python-style codes, flow-charts, pseudocode and data representation
- Students are also expected to complete an independent Programming project. Students will be given 20 hours of timetabled lessons to complete the project. This project is not graded and will not affect students' final GCSE grade – Year 11 have done this already.
