

### Citizenship Map – Year 10

<u>Term</u>	<u>Unit</u>	<u>Description</u>
10.1	<b><u>Rights and Responsibility</u></b> The Courts and Criminal Justice	Students recap from year 9 on the difference between criminal and civil law, common and statute law. Students explore the court hierarchy system in the UK, how workers can challenge their employer in courts and the importance of having an open judicial through having a jury. Students consider the key case of Stephen Lawrence and the impact it had on the criminal justice system.
10.2	<b><u>Politics and Participation</u></b> Understanding Democracy	Students are taught the difference between democracy and dictatorship through a range of countries. Students understanding the concept of separation of power and the need for our MPs. Students compare and contrast the political system between UK and USA.
10.3	<b><u>Politics and Participation</u></b> Understanding the wider UK democracy	Students continue in their political learning however now looking wider away from the workings of central government. Students explore workings of local government, devolved government and further into Europe. Students explore deeper the voting systems in the UK.
10.4	<b><u>Life in Modern Britain</u></b> Identity and Media	Students revisit the concept of identity from year 9 and apply it to the concepts of right wing and left-wing media. How the media works with government/politicians. Students explore the impact of the phone hacking scandal and how that has changed the workings of our media.
10.5	<b><u>Life in Modern Britain</u></b> Conflict and International Organisations	Students explore the impact of leaving the EU. Students consider key international conflicts and the organisations that have been involved. Students consider the UKs role with international organisations such as NATO and UN.
10.6	<b><u>Rights and Responsibilities</u></b> Human Rights and International Law	Students revisit rights and responsibilities and applying it to the rights of young people. Students explore the rights of prisoners in relation to voting. Students examine the case of Rwanda and Srebrenica and the conflict around human rights.
