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History lecture from 'The Rest is History' podcast





Year 11 History Trip









Eighty Year 11 students embarked on a memorable day trip to Belgium, exploring key historical sites connected to their studies of World War I. Their journey took them to the trenches, Hill 62, and the solemn Tyne Cot Cemetery. Immersing themselves in history, students had the unique opportunity to dress in period uniforms and gas masks while expert tour guides vividly described the harsh realities of life during the war.

The weather was on our side, with golden sunshine casting a poignant glow over the white stone

graves at Tyne Cot Cemetery. A particularly moving moment came when one of our students, whose relative had fought in WWI, laid a wreath on behalf of our school. We ended the trip with a visit to the town of Ypres, visiting the famous chocolate shop that has become legendary with our Year 11 students from yesteryear.

It was an insightful and deeply moving experience. Our students conducted themselves impeccably, with the tour guides praising them as a true credit to our school.



To celebrate British Science Week 2025 we have had a range of activities for each year group. Year 7 are looking forward to a Safari Session in the theatre on the 29th of April. Super scientists from Year 8 were invited to come and do exciting experiments during lunch times. We flame tested mystery solutions to identify them, made toothpaste for elephants, generated static electricity, made flames dance to heavy basslines and set a science teacher on fire!! The students in each session definitely enjoyed them, and there was a lot of interest from other

students looking through the windows as well! We took Triple Science students from Year 9 to the Science Museum this week, and Combined Science students enjoyed exciting lessons about space. Year 10 Triple Science students conducted a project to design innovative solutions to the problem of plastic waste in the ocean. All year groups took part in a science themed Kahoot! and a poster project on the theme "Change and Adapt". The winning posters will be awarded prizes in assembly after Easter.
